



An Autobiography

Meet your newly elected Bremerton Base Treasurer. Dutch, like many of us, had a 'taste' of the skimmer Navy before coming to our senses and requesting submarine duty. We believe this someway results in a greater appreciation for 'das boots.' In retirement, Dutch volunteers for various subvets projects and teaches a weekly computer class at the Kitsap library.

The Navy was almost always fun and it was an enjoyable way to make a living while doing something worthwhile. I sure enjoyed it right up to my last job. You communication types will appreciate that statement when I get to it.

I quit school as soon as I was 16. That was ok in Illinois where I was born and raised.

I hated school from the first day when a teacher stopped me from whistling. I skipped school every chance I got and I was lucky to learn to read, write, and perform basic arithmetic.

After I quit school, I worked in a printing plant, the only industry in my hometown. Most of the employees were WWII U.S. Army veterans. They told me that four years in the Navy couldn't be twice as bad as two years in the Army, so I joined the Navy just before I was drafted. That was in February 1957.

The Navy recruiter didn't promise me a damn thing except three square meals a day and a dry place to sleep, if I was lucky. That sounded pretty good to me. I went to boot camp at Great Lakes. I wanted to be a machinery repairman but I scored one point above minimum for electronics schools and the Navy was desperate for electronics personnel so off I went to Aviation Electronics school to become an AT.

Treasury: You can be proud of your work at the fireworks stand or buying fireworks from us last Jun/Jul 2004 for it supplied half the funds that went to our well deserving local submariners' children attending or getting ready to



attend college in the form of 8, \$1K checks. Another \$1K was provided to the USSVI Charitable Foundation's Scholarship Fund. Base Commander Bob Webster needs to be praised for going through "Hell Week" (leading and busting butt) the past 2 years and taking it on for a 3rd year now.

The other half of the funding and more were acquired by our annual raffle and direct donations to the Lt. William "Willie" Spoon Memorial Scholarship. Our supporters in the business community have a great deal to do with this as they supplied most of the raffle prizes and a few made large direct donations as did some of our members. The grand total net was in excess of \$7,000. Our new Base Commander, **John Gardner**, can be proud of leading this effort.

Below is a summary of the treasury, by category, as of June 25, 2005.

> General Fund: 18,927.14 Scholarship Fund: 7,757.44 Base Life Membership Fund: 19,990.00 Total \$46,674.58

Membership: We took our normal attrition in April as several annual members did not continue their association. Most will, in the long term. We dropped from 284 members to 269, and are now at 272.

For those with National Life Membership and annual base membership (\$10/yr), I suggest you take base life before the end of September as your annual dues will be applied to your base life membership. Our base bylaws were amended to return to pre 2005 rates: over 65, \$50; 55-64; \$100; 45-54, \$150; <45, \$250.

On 31 July, I turn over Base Treasurer duties to **Dutch Kaiser**. I will give him a thorough turn over and will be always available to advise. Dutch is computer literate and will have no problem keeping our finances in order.

I will then take over Vice Commander duties. As you know, the Vice has nothing to do, but substitute...but if you look at the bylaws he does have something to do...if he wants too. However, I will also assume the Willie Spoon Scholarship drive next year. I owe this not only to Willie, but Bev Rogers and base founder, Tudor Davis, for their persistence to making that endeavor the focus of the base's annual charitable contribution to our local sub-

mariners' children and grandchildren.

While in school someone decided I should be an AQ, Aviation Fire Control. I spent 36 weeks in a 24 week school because I kept flunking the weekly tests. Each week I would go before a board. My instructors told the board that I was trying real hard and I cried a lot so the board kept repeating me until I learned the material.

I finally graduated and went to Fighter Squadron 64 at Alameda, CA. They had just got F3H airplanes with the AERO 19G fire control system. I was the oldest of three AQAN's and the most senior so I was in charge. The AERO 19G was called the most sophisticated fire control system in the world by Aviation and Space Weekly magazine. It had fire control and doppler radars and a primitive computer that the Sparrow 3 missile used for guidance information. The test equipment we used to tune that system weighed over 500 pounds and we had to haul the equipment back an forth from the flight deck to the hanger deck.

The compliment of senior AQ's began arriving. They had converted to AQ in hope of making rate and were ex-Ships Servicemen, Ordnancemen, Boatswain Mates, Cooks, Seabees, Cannon Cockers and you name it. They were Chiefs, and 1st Class POs and they relied on us Airmen to teach them the technical maintenance of the system. In turn they showed us the ropes of the way the Navy worked! Interesting to say the least. I made three nine month cruises aboard the *USS Midway CVA-41* in the next 3 years.

I married my neighbor, Katie Fitzsimmons, in our hometown while on Christmas leave from "A" school. We are still married. I count that the luckiest thing that ever happened to me. We did not see much of each other in my first four years in the Navy.

One time in Yokosuka, I had shore patrol, assigned to the riot squad. We were called to a bar to break up a fight. There were about a dozen sailors fighting. Four, as I remember, were Submariners and we took them back to the boat. The SP Officer told the topside watch to get the Duty Officer. The DO came out of that fleet boat hatch greasy and disheveled. The SP Officer demanded the Submariners be punished for their transgressions and the DO said he would see to it the very next day. I don't think anything ever happened to them do you? Submariners also had overnight liberty in Japan whereas we had Cinderella liberty. That convinced me the Submarine Navy was pretty good.

During the second cruise one of the Quemoy Matsu incidents occurred. We spent much time in the Taiwan straights and received a Expeditionary Medal. I never saw any bullets but some of our airplanes returned with holes in them.

When my four years were up, I had enough, got out of the Navy and we went back to our hometown. I went back to work at the printing plant making lead "pigs" for linotype machines, and was lucky to get the work. Later, my Navy training helped me land a job with the telephone company in the big city, (30,000 souls), 35 miles away. It paid a whopping \$1.25 an hour. I worked the "frame" changing telephone numbers by soldering wires to different lugs. A co-worker had been with the company 40 years and I remember thinking, is this all there is?

One day I looked out the window and saw a Navy Chief

going into a bar across the street. At lunch time I went over and joined him. After a bunch of drinks he re-enlisted me in the Navy. The wife was happy when I told her although she thought I should have talked it over with her before signing. She was glad to see a steady wage as we had our oldest son by then.

I went to AQ "B" school in Memphis, TN and then ordered to instructor duty at AQ "A" school, also in Memphis. Our next son was born there. During lunch one day I was reading an article in *All Hands* that described the two crew concept of FBM's. Whoa! This sounded real good to me. Three months on and three months off. I ask the Personnel Office to write a letter requesting a transfer to the FT rate and Submarines. After much pleading I finally got the letter written but much to my surprise it was sent to the Bureau without any recommendation either way. Several months went by and I did not hear anything so I thought my request had fell on deaf ears.

Low and behold, one day a Captain wearing both Dolphins and Wings (I suppose that is the only way he could get on an Airdale base), showed up and announced that those desiring conversion to ET and FT should meet with him. I told him my story and said I would like to volunteer. He said, "You are accepted and will get orders." I've often wondered if my letter gave someone the idea of converting Airdales to Submariners. The Submarine Force was expanding rapidly and there was not enough qualified people to man all the boats.

Sure enough, three weeks later I received orders to Sub School. After Sub School I went to Damn Neck, VA for "C" school then on to the *USS George C. Marshall SSBN-654* in new construction at Newport News. I was one of the first crew members to get there. Most of the crew was former Fleet Boat sailors including both Captains. I sure learned a lot from them. It was a lot of work but a fine experience. We commissioned the *Marshall* and was stationed at New London. I made seven patrols.

Early into one patrol a mess cook dropped a garbage container on the ball valve on the GDU. It opened but could not be shut. The "A" ganger's tried everything but could not get it shut. The GDU was broken for the rest of patrol. We



stored dry garbage in the torpedo and engine rooms. Wet garbage or "garbage sickles", as we called them, went into the freeze box. Upon surfacing for approach to Rota we started dumping the garbage over board. The "garbage sickles" began thawing as we hauled them up the ladder to throw them out the sail hatch. Oh boy, did we smell pretty! We set the

record for a smelly boat entering port. The tender sailors were holding their noses as we came alongside.

Someone, it must have been a nuke, got an idea to collect and save all belly button lint in a jar to raffle away at the off crew party. Mission accomplished! A lucky wife won the raffle. Boy was she happy—a gallon jar of belly button lint.

The *Marshall* was involved in an incident described in *Blind Man's Bluff*. When it occurred we were forcefully warned to keep it a secret so I was surprised to see it described in the book. Most thought repairs necessary to make the boat seaworthy again could not be accomplished by the tender in Rota. Everyone was amazed when the Repair Officer said it could be done. He and his crew of Divers and Shipfitters did the impossible. That repair job was the most amazing thing I saw while in the Navy. They fabricated a giant cofferdam on the tender helo deck while "the Russian fishing fleet" watched. It was November so someone painted "BOB HOPE CHRISTMAS SHOW"on the fabrication.

I made Chief at New London and was initiated the "old way" at the Chiefs Club. You, who have been there, may remember some of the characters who hung around. The initiation started at noon and at 1600 we "new" Chiefs were thrown into Rock Lake. The water was sure cold in May. That may have been the last time new Chiefs were tossed into the lake. After the ceremony we had a hell of a party.

I got orders to Damn Neck for instructor duty after my tour on *Marshall*. Except for some pretty wild parties the tour was rather mild compared to duty aboard a Submarine. When my rotation time came I went to *USS Francis Scott Key SSBN 657* in overhaul at Puget Sound Naval Yard.

I arrived at the beginning of the overhaul. The yard period was uneventful except for a steam valve that was under test on a barge. It came loose and hit our van broadside. The yard safety crew said that the trajectory was such that if our van had not been there the valve would have gone into the machine shop and may have killed someone. The yard paid for restoration of the van, but it was never the same.

Key left Bremerton and went to Charleston where we made several patrols. During an off-crew I happened to mention to the wives that their family grams were boring. We always got the same old messages. You know, "Everything alright", "I love you", etc. Boy that was a mistake. Katie and some of the other wives took my statement as a challenge and I received no more boring family grams albeit some were rather strange. One of them read:

"BOY AND GIRL. BORN 14 JUN, FLAG DAY. TIME. 12 STRAIGHT UP. PLACE, IN THE CLOSET WITH THE MARINE. LOCATION, AT KATHY HANSON'S. CONDITION, WELL. MOTHER, SQUIRRELLY. NAMES: PETER OUT. JOY IN. SANTA'S GIFT ARRIVED EARLY. LOVE, KATIE"

I was puzzled by this. I even accused the Radiomen of making it up but the CO assured me it was a "real" family gram. Subsequent family grams were just as mysterious. The entire crew looked forward to my family grams so they could guess at what was going on. I figured they were some kind of



ROBALO was sunk 26 July 1944, two miles off the western coast of Palawan Island as a result of an explosion of her After Battery. Four men swam ashore, an officer and three enlisted men: Samuel L. Tucker, ENS; Floyd G. Laughlin, QM1; Wallace K. Martin, SM3; and Mason C. Poston, EM2. They made their way through the jungles to a small barrio northwest of the Puerto Princesa camp. They were captured there by Japanese Military Police, and confined in the jail. They were held for guerilla activities rather than as prisoners of war, it is said. On 15 August 1944, they were evacuated by a Japanese destroyer, and nothing further is known of their destination or whereabouts. They may have been executed by the Japanese or the destroyer may have been sunk. At any rate, they were never recovered and their note stated that there were no other survivors.

It is doubted that a battery explosion could be sufficiently violent to cause the sinking of the boat; more likely *ROBALO* struck an enemy mine.

ROBALO earned two battle stars for World War II service.

joke, but I wasn't prepared for what greeted me when we returned from patrol. My wife and her partners in crime rigged up a full size dummy that looked pretty realistic. They put it in the back of our pickup truck and named him Freddie. I was assured that he was the father of our twins and I was the brunt of many a joke over that incident. It was a small price to pay to see the wives have so much fun teasing me and in a way I was honored.

After my tour on the *Key* I transferred to Strategic Weapons Facility Pacific (SWFPAC) at Bangor. I arrived before Trident. What great duty that was. They didn't have much use for an FT in missile production so I was assigned to security—7000 acres and a truck to drive. That meant for some wonderful days in the woods. The fun stopped when someone got a brilliant idea that I was a perfect candidate for Classified Material Systems (CMS) Officer. My tour was up before Trident construction got serious and I retired from the Navy.

I worked for a Defense contractor and for Civil Service and felt I was a misfit in both jobs. Then I landed a job teaching maintenance of an Automatic Fingerprint System for a French company. They sold systems all over the world so I traveled a lot and worked with police in many cities and states and some overseas. I spent a lot of time with New York State and New York City police agencies. That was an education! I can honestly say there isn't enough money anywhere for me to be a policeman.

The Navy was great! I had a lot of fun at each duty station while completing the mission. One of the things that I enjoy now is assembling and disassembling the USSVI fireworks stand with fellow shipmates. No one needs to be "in charge"


ETCM(SS) Brian "Bo" Bofinger, USN, CMC, CSS-19 represented the Post Cold War era and active duty Subvets.


He has served on several SSN 688's and SSBN 726's from 1984 to 2003.

<u>CMDCM(SS)</u> Ron Johnson, USN, CSG-9, also an active duty subvet, read the scroll of lost Boats.



Armed Forces Day Parade


The city of Bremerton paid tribute to the men and women of the armed forces, both active duty and retired, with the nation's largest and longest running Armed Forces parade.
